The deformity became even more pronounced as the bones in her fingers began to tilt in the direction of her little finger. Her doctor called this **Ulnar drift**.

For most of her life Linda had taken the flexible padding in between each bone for granted. Now ever aware of the **cartilage** that was crumbling in her joints, Linda struggled with tasks like getting dressed and preparing food. Life with rheumatoid arthritis meant that her joints would lose form and function, making her past times like knitting and baking out of reach.
