# Highlights from keynote speech

---

- Qualitative Data-Mining
  - Utilizes existing data to better understand agency practice
  - Fosters new knowledge about client populations and emerging problems
  - Generates new knowledge about child welfare practice and case complexity
  - Deepens understanding of the underlying factors that contribute child welfare outcomes
  - Compliments the CQI process

# When to use QDM

---

- When you want to explore causal relationships
- When you want to place information into context
- When you want to ask a question that starts with “why”
- When you want to ask a question that starts with “how”
- When you want a variable for quantitative analysis that isn't currently available to you

# Nuts & bolts: CW-QDM process

---

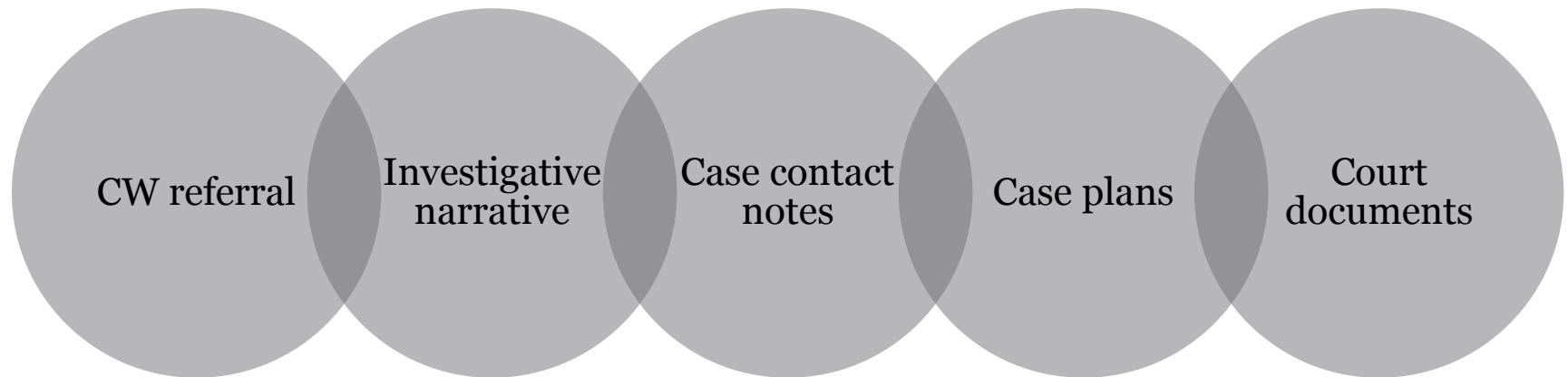
- Identifying practice & research concerns
- Developing practice research questions
- Identifying qualitative data sources & assessing data
- Data extraction and preparation
- Analysis and documentation of findings
- Dissemination of findings and integration into practice

# Concerns and questions

Concern	Question
Application of abuse or neglect categories	How are caseworkers interpreting and applying a certain maltreatment type?
Increased rates of re-entry for certain groups	Why does this group re-enter at higher rates?
Emerging issues, problems, or trends	How is maltreatment/trauma experienced by youth who become pregnant while in care?

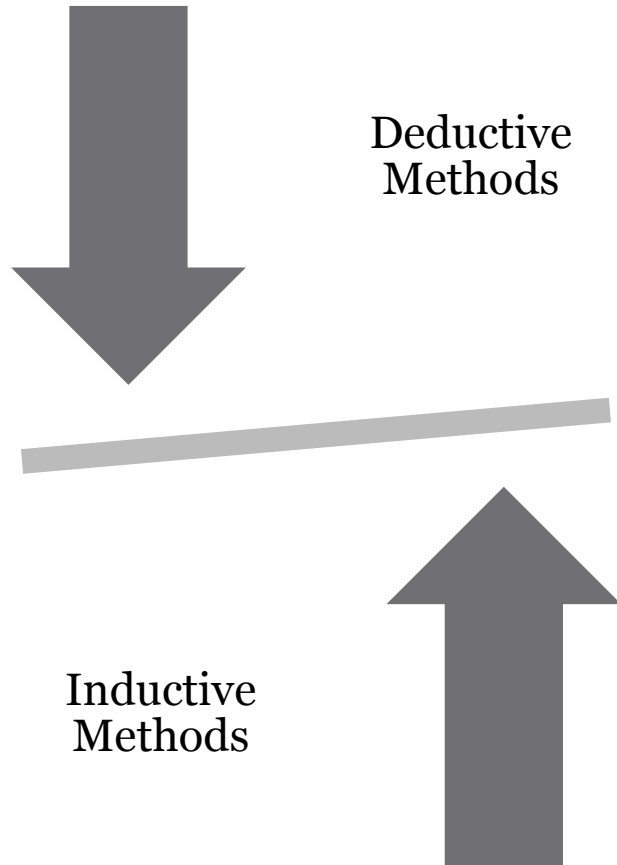

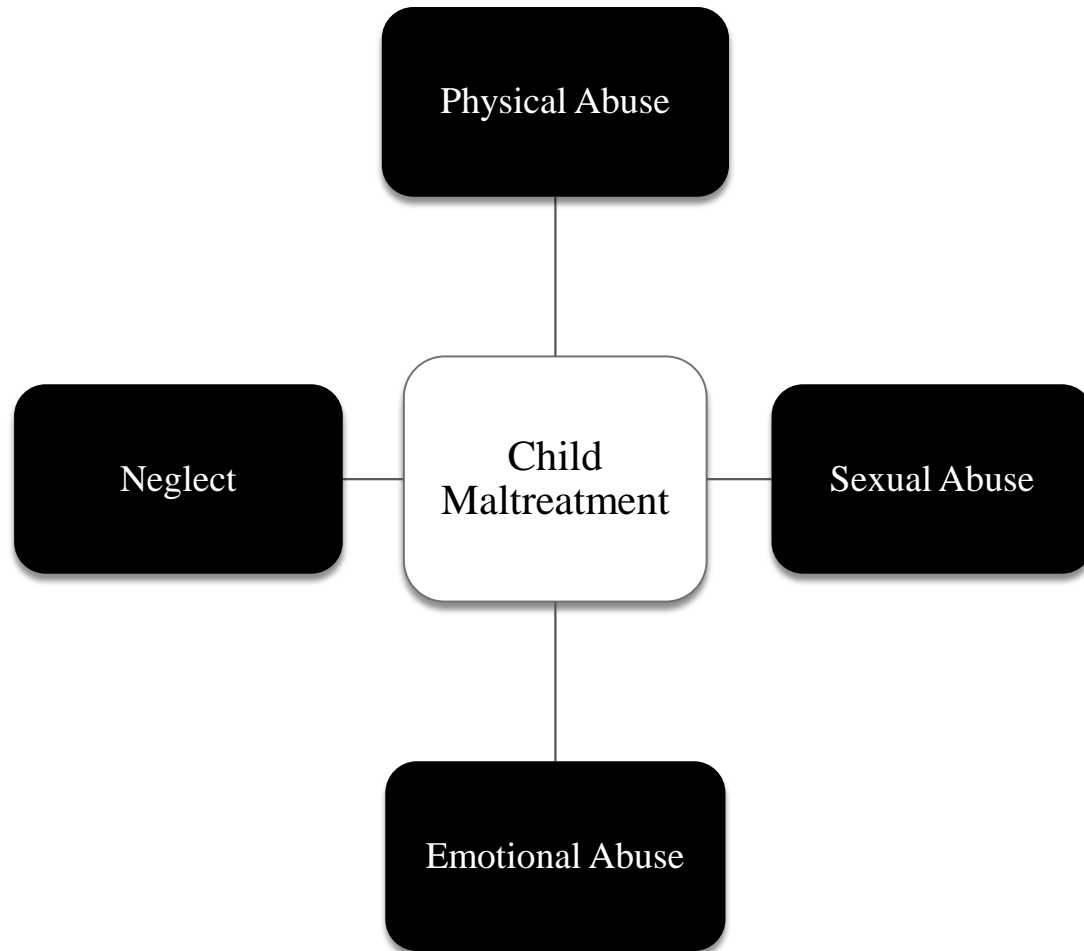

# Analyzing data: coding strategies



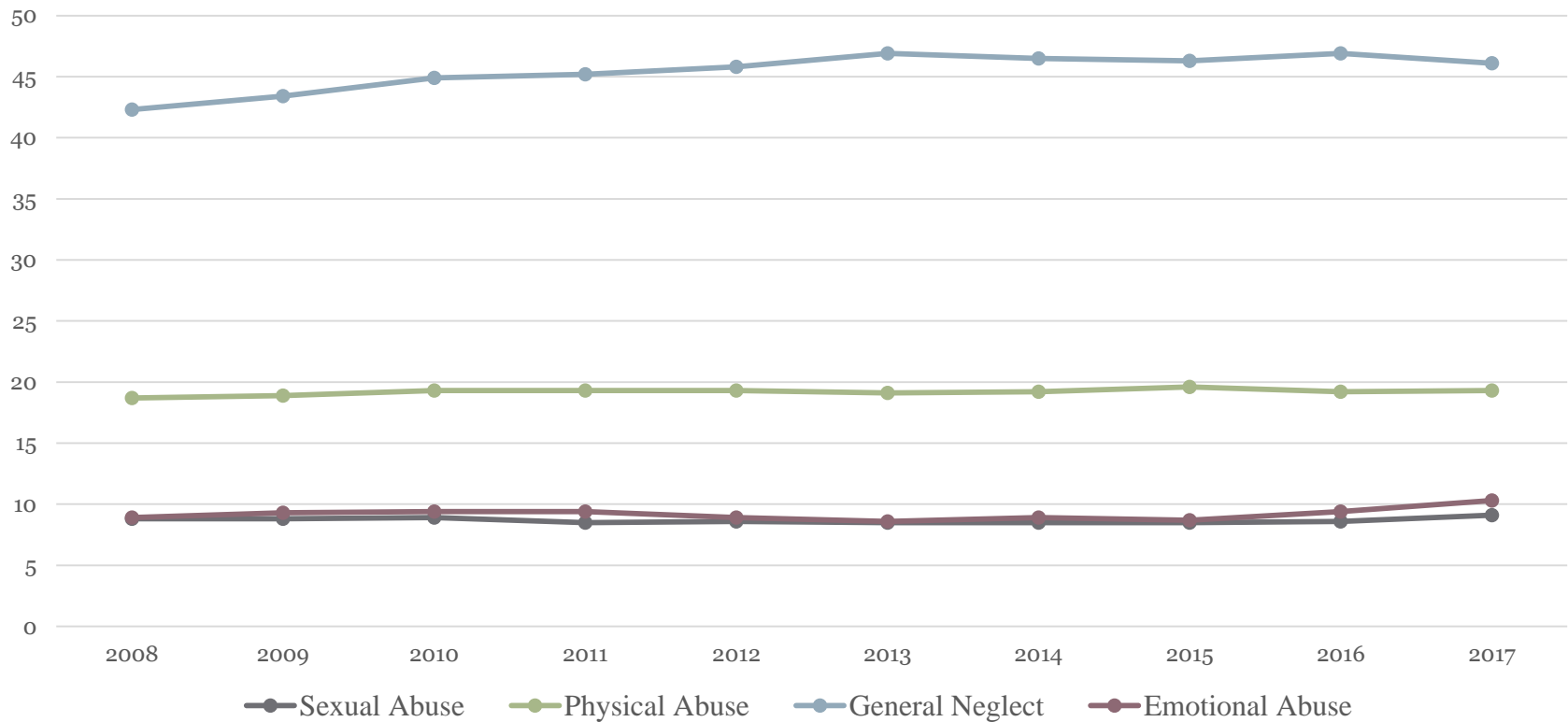
- Read through a handful of documents with your question in mind to ground yourself in the data
- Assign initial codes that say something meaningful about the document
- Then look for important commonalities and differences across codes
- Using your codes as a guide, begin to sort your documents into broader categories related to your research question

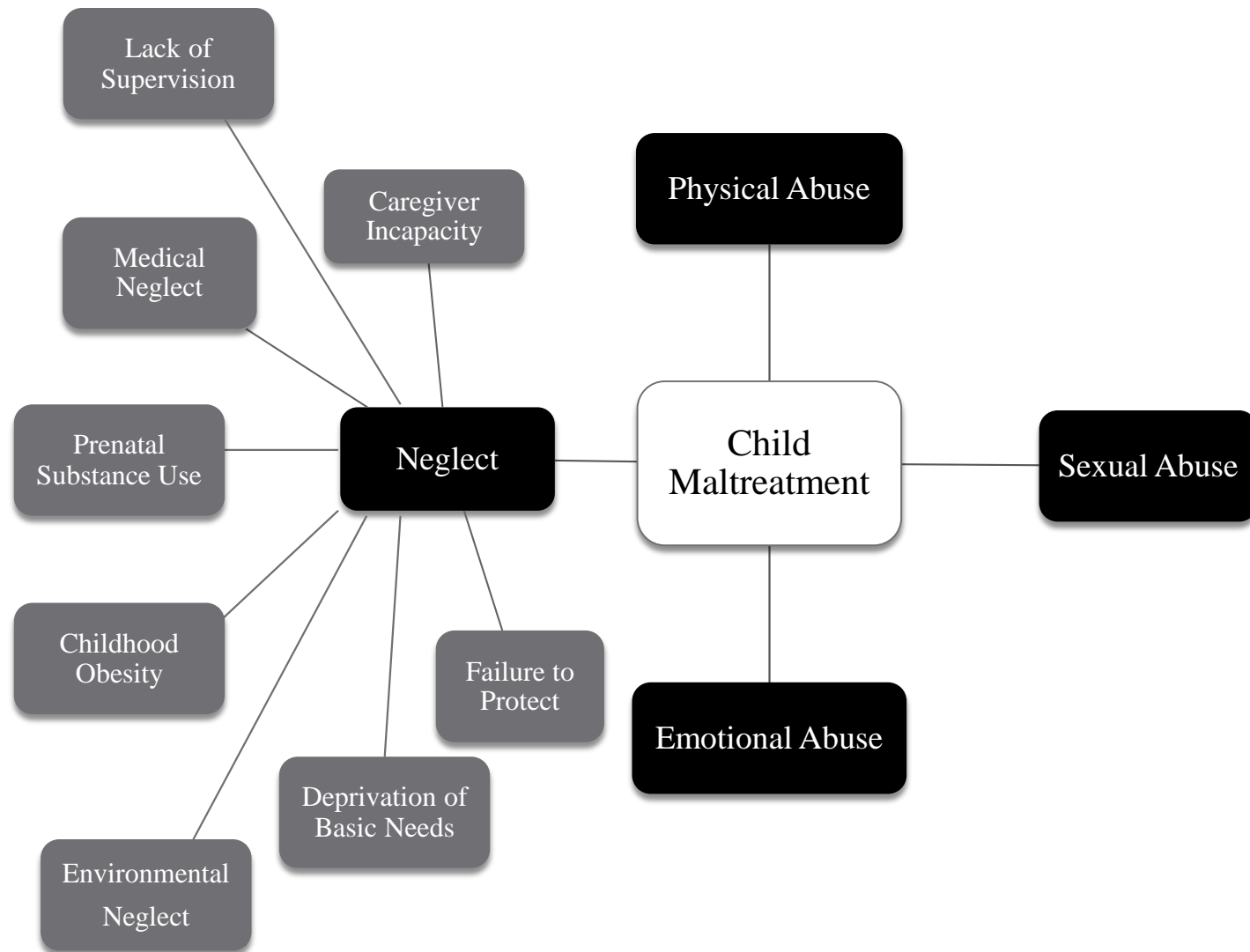

California 2008-2017

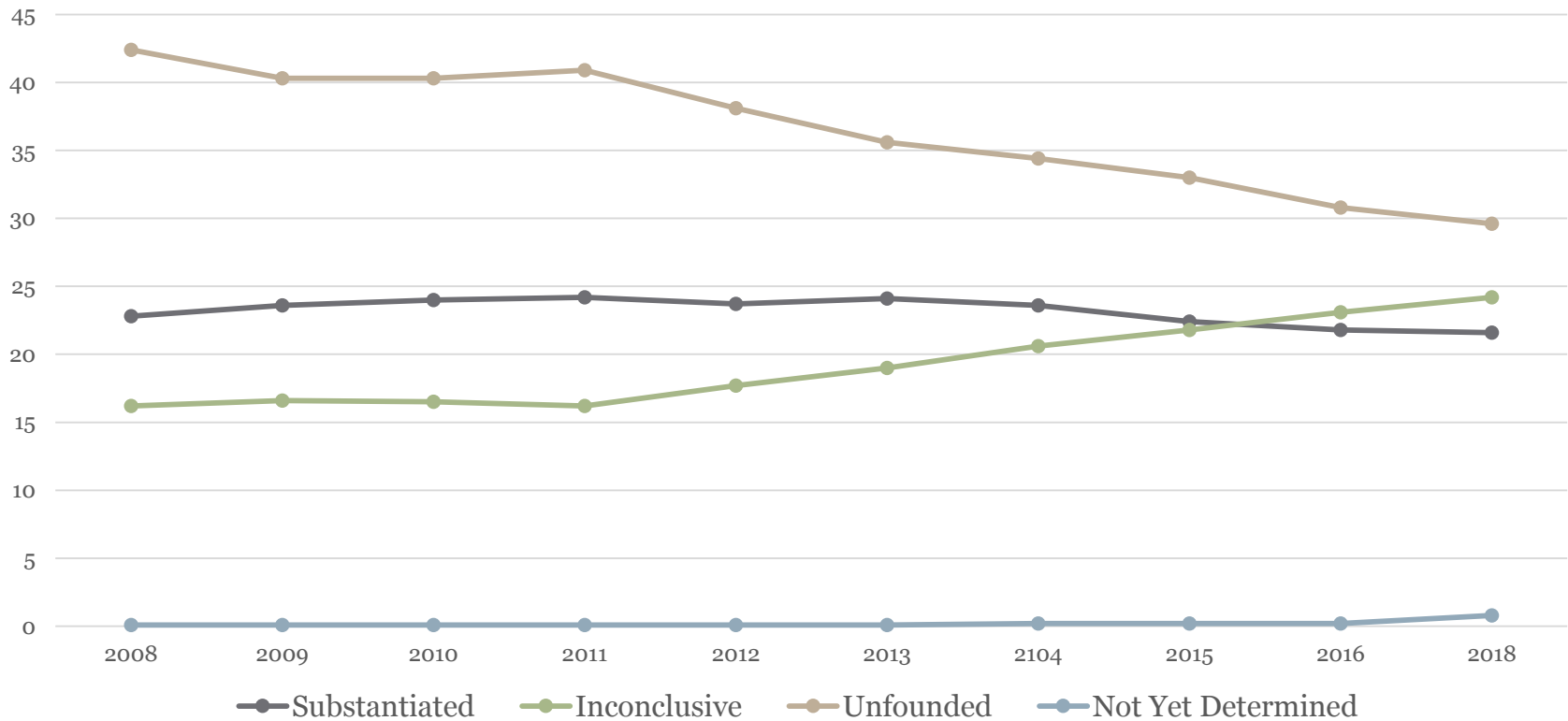

Neglect substantiations: Under what conditions and with what justification?

# Case study

- Concern: State has guidelines for substantiating neglect. We can use quantitative analysis to know how often neglect is substantiated, against whom, and in what counties, but we don't know the context in which neglect is occurring or the basis for caseworker decisions to substantiate.
- Question: Under what conditions and with what justification do caseworkers substantiate neglect?
- Data source: Investigation narratives
- Analyzing data: Read through cases, assign initial codes, group into categories, compile findings.

# Case study

Context of Neglect	Justification for substantiation
Caregiver does not meet the child's immediate needs for supervision, food, clothing, and/or medical or mental health care.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• The caregiver leaves the child alone in circumstances that create opportunities for serious harm, e.g., child left unattended in vehicle.</li><li>• The child's nutritional needs are not met, resulting in danger to the child's health and/or safety, including malnutrition and morbid obesity.</li></ul>
The physical living conditions are hazardous and immediately threatening to the health and/or safety of the child	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Excessive garbage or rotted or spoiled food that threatens health.</li><li>• Guns and other weapons are not locked and not properly secured.</li><li>• Drug production in the home.</li><li>• Substances or objects within reach of child that may endanger his/her health and/or safety.</li></ul>
Failure to protect	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• The caregiver does not provide supervision necessary to protect the child from potentially serious harm by others.</li><li>• The caregiver takes the child to dangerous locations where drugs are manufactured or regularly administered.</li><li>• In circumstances of domestic violence, the non-offending caregiver is not able to protect him/herself or the child from immediate threat of physical and emotional harm.</li></ul>
