# Literature Reviews: How to locate them, and how do they inform program and evaluation?

#### What can a literature review tell me?

- What has worked with populations similar to yours
- What elements or features have been included in programs/practices
- Which features have been linked with successful outcomes
- What barriers to success have been encountered and how they can be avoided/dealt with
- What areas of program content are controversial or have not yet been shown to be successful

#### When do I need a literature review?

- When preparing a grant proposal
- o Developing training related to program implementation or practice changes
- Developing programs or policy

### How do I locate articles?

- Search:
  - o Clearinghouse/professional organization websites
  - Google Scholar <u>http://scholar.google.com</u> Links to library resources and some full text articles
  - University library databases (e.g. Psych Info)
- Identify recent summary articles
- Use a summary article to identify other relevant references, authors, search terms, model programs, generally agreed upon knowledge and areas of controversy

#### How do I know if I have enough information?

- When your questions about a practice or policy have been answered
- Generally go back about 10 years. Include older articles if they are "classics" (e.g. an article that lays the early groundwork that is cited by almost everybody else).
- Include published and unpublished literature (e.g. grant final reports)
