METHODS FOR DETERMINING THE MEANING OF MYSTERY WORDS

There are several methods that we can use to determine the meaning of unknown words in a text.

For example, we can use the context clues method to help us determine the meaning of unknown words.

Context clues-looked at the words around the unknown word to try to determine what the words mean.

ROOT WORD STRATEGY

Another strategy that you can use to tackle unfamiliar words is to use root words.

The root is the base part of a word. The root carries the most significant aspects of a word, and cannot be reduced into smaller parts.

By knowing the root of a word, you can often guess the meaning of the word, even if you have never seen the word before.

AFFIXES

Another helpful way to understand new words is to understand the meaning of affixes. You are most likely familiar with affixes since these are introduced early in elementary school as a foundation for spelling. Many new words are formed by adding an affix to the beginning or end of a root word.

When an affix is added to the beginning of a root or root word, it is called a prefix.

When an affix is added to the end of a root or root word, it is called a suffix.


PREFIXES

A prefix is a group of letters placed before the root of a word. For example, the word "unhappy" consists of the prefix "un-", which means "not", combined with the word "happy". The word "unhappy" means "not happy."



SUFFIXES

A suffix is a group of letters placed after the root of a word. For example, the word speechless consists of the root word "speech" combined with the suffix "-less", which means "without". The word "speechless" means "without speech or unable to speak."



SUFFIXES

The most common suffixes are -s and -es, which mean more than one (or the plural) of the word. Adding -es to wish, changes the meaning of the word to more than one wish.
