


Visualize

Remember to:


- Pay attention to any **descriptive** words the author uses.
- Think about **what you already know** about the characters, setting, or situation the author is describing.
- Using both the description and your prior knowledge, close your eyes and **try to form a picture** of what the author is describing.
- Remember, the image that you have in your mind may **change** and grow as you continue reading.

Point of View

- **1st person:** The narrator is a character in the story and participates in the events described. A first-person narrator refers to himself or herself using I and me.
- **3rd person:** The narrator is not a character in the story and does not participate in the action. The narrator uses the pronouns he, him, she, her, it, they, and them in reference to the characters.



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
Elements of a Tall Tale

1. Larger-than-life characters, including a hero.
2. Events that could not possibly happen in real life.
3. Contains hyperbole, or exaggeration, to make the story entertaining.





A narrator establishes the tall tale character with a fantastic origin story. Often, the character has historic roots in the real world.






An adventure begins ... the character heads into the world and into the story.



The Narrative Arc of a Tall Tale Story

The character confronts challenges and/or antagonists, with humor and ingenuity. Hyperbole is layered thick.



Often, some natural or historical event is "explained" by the character's humorous intervention.




Synonyms and Antonyms

Synonyms are words that have the same or similar meanings, such as enormous and huge.

Antonyms are words that have opposite meanings, such as enormous and tiny.


